

GREAT FINANCE PROBLEMS.

GERMAN LEADERS TALK ON SILVER AND IMPERIAL REVENUE PLANS.

Disunion Dead, They Assert, and No Hope for Equilibrium in the United States. The New Tax Schemes for Germany.

Paris, July 23.—The departure of the German and Imperial Deputies from the city and the absence of Emperor William and several Ministers on their vacations have caused the temporary suspension of strife in domestic politics, and have left the minds of Berlin editors and politicians free to consider international questions.

The most notable comments were made by Dr. Gebhard, Governor of the Deutsche Bank. The present crisis, he said, was the most serious one in the history of the silver market since the formation of the Latin Union in 1865.

Dr. Gebhard continued, had destroyed the phantom of bimetalism, that not even the United States were able or would attempt to revive. Whatever might be the loss of the American mine owners, the Washington Congress would not desert the Latin Union.


