LABOR MEN ARE GETTING THAT IDEA INTO THEIR HEADS AGAIN. The Central Labor Union Has Taken Steps Looking to a Trade Union Alliance Which May Have a Political Side.

Another attempt is to be made by the Central Labor Union to harness the remnants of all the Central bodies which have been engaged in a perpetual war. The C. L. U. yesterday appointed a committee of ten to take the first steps. The committee consists of Delegates Daily, Bales, Henry, Arnold, Keating, Cuddeback, Towner, Gardner, Edwards, and Pratt.

The committee was instructed with power to call a convention of all the trade unions and arrange upon a basis of harmony. After the meeting was over some of the delegates were invited to attend a meeting of all the unions. A number of them had already met in the city hall on Monday, and starting an independent political party, to be ready to run candidates for Mayor next year.
