

QUORUMS WILL BE COUNTED.

DEMOCRATS ADOPT THE RULE IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Speeches of Speaker Clegg's Party Stand Out Against Bi-Party Republicans Vote for Bi-Party Cooperation.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The only opponents to the proposed quorum-counting rule of the Democrats which was adopted in the House today were forty-seven members of Speaker Clegg's own party.

When the vote was announced, the Republicans proceeded to shake hands with Tom Reed and congratulate him on his victory.

It is the opinion of a large majority of the Democrats that the party has at last done a wise thing in adopting a rule that will permit the transaction of business by those who are ready to do so.

Mr. Clegg is not enthusiastic over the adoption of the new rule, but he is too good a party man to attempt to interfere with its enforcement.

At once upon the opening of the session today the House was precipitated into an animated, not to say bitter, controversy over the proposition to count a quorum.

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He said that he had hoped the House would have adopted the rule of the majority.

Mr. Clegg said he was chiefly to express his regret that the gentleman from Maine (Mr. Reed) was the parent of the rule.

Mr. Reed (Rep., Pa.) said he recognized the right of the majority to make rules, but he did not wish to make rules that would punish the minority.
