

TO TEST MOTORMEN'S SIGHT.

TROLLEY ACCIDENTS DUE TO DEFECTIVE VISION.

This Discovery Results in the Examination of Motormen in Jersey City and Newark. No Examination in Brooklyn, Although a Trolley's Death Record for the Past Year Numbers as High as Fifty-two.

All the motormen employed by the Consolidated Traction Company in the city of Newark got orders to appear at the office of the company's physician and undergo an examination for the purpose of ascertaining whether there was any defect in their sight. The order was issued by General Manager David Young, who is the general manager of the Newark line.

General Manager Young, when seen at his home in Belleville last night, said that, so far as he knew, there had been but one accident due to this cause on any of the lines his company operated.
