The Congress Elections.

The renomination of the Hon. THOMAS H. REED for Congress is accompanied by a declaration on the part of his constituents that they are in a position to get the full benefit of his services.

Of course TOM REED will be Speaker in the Fifty-fourth Congress, providing the Republicans elect a majority of the members of the House. Of course he will be President, providing he gets himself nominated and elected in 1908, and preserves his uncommonly robust health until March 4, 1907.

With TOM REED in the field for Congressman for the First Maine district, for Speaker of the Fifty-fourth House, and for President of the United States, not simultaneously, it is all well and good.

The Democracy has such an everlasting tussle with its own innate cussedness that it almost forgets at times that there is any politics going except Democratic politics.

Truth compels us to say that just now depression rather than exultation prevails among the Democratic rank and file; but there is at least one cheering thought.

The extreme difficulty, not to say impossibility, of overcoming Chinese persistency and dogged determination, even by a series of brilliant victories in the field, was revealed to the Japanese in the memorable war for the conquest of Korea.

Since February, 1871, that portion of the duties of a United States Marshal which included the appointment of a horde of special deputies to interfere with the voters in the exercise of their lawful right of suffrage has been regarded as a disgraceful and a degrading office.

The new Marshal, who may be said to take on where ISAIAH RYNDERS left off (RYNDEBS was appointed by President BUCHANAN), will be lawfully restricted to the performance of the ordinary and legitimate functions of a United States Marshal.

The mandates of the United States Marshal, exercising civil or criminal authority in those cases wherein the Federal Government has exclusive jurisdiction. In other districts the enforcement of court orders for the preservation of the public peace, and the protection of inter-State commerce, has recently devolved upon United States Marshals.
