JAPAN'S DECLARATION OF WAR.

The Emperor's Statement of His Country's Grievances and Intentions.

Yokohama, Aug. 18.—The steamship Emperor of Japan, which arrived yesterday at Yokohama on the 18th inst., two days after Japan had declared war against China. The following is the substance of the declaration:

"We, by the grace of Heaven, Emperor of Japan, seated on a throne occupied by the same dynasty from time immemorial, have received your proclamation of war on our loyal and brave subjects as follows: We hereby declare war against China, and we command each and all of our competent authorities in obedience to our wish, and with a view to the attainment of the national aim, to carry hostilities by sea and land against China, at all the means at their disposal, consistently with the laws of nations."

A SUCCESSFUL THIEF AT 72.

CARRIE REESE'S SPECIALTY IS DRUGGING HER MISTRESS.

She is Active and Makes a Good Servant, but Her Employer is Likely to Wake Up Some Morning with a Headache and a Sore Back. Carrie Reese, who sometimes calls herself Carrie Martin, and sometimes Katie McLaughlin, was arrested by Detectives Campbell and Lang of the East Fifty-first street station, yesterday afternoon, for robbing Mrs. Catherine Keegan of \$24 Sixth avenue of clothing and jewelry on Aug. 9.

The prisoner, who is an active little woman of 72 years, has committed three clever robberies in the last month or so and carried off \$500 worth of plunder. About the last of June she went to work as a servant for a respectable elderly woman who lives in 177th street, between Second and Third avenues. She was so active and clever that she won the confidence of her mistress, and practically took charge of everything about the house.

On July 2, after the mistress of the house had eaten one of Carrie's tempting breakfasts, she became sleepy, and Carrie insisted on putting her to bed. Late in the afternoon Carrie's mistress awoke. Her head was swimming and she could not stand. Carrie had disappeared.

In a few days the woman discovered that during her slumber Carrie had brought in an agent of the Harlem Loan Company and had mortgaged all her furniture for \$25. Carrie had kept up the woman's insurance papers, and she showed to the agent, and had her mistress's name to the mortgage.

She was arrested shortly after, but her mistress refused to appear in court, and the loan company did not wish to prosecute, so Carrie was released.

Carrie next went to work under the name of Mary Martin, for Mrs. Mary Vogt of 737 Third avenue. She pleased Mrs. Vogt as well as she had pleased her former mistress. A short time after she had engaged Mrs. Vogt awoke very late with her head swimming and a feeling of general weakness.

Carrie had gone, and upon looking about Mrs. Vogt found that her servant had taken several hundred dollars' worth of clothing and jewelry. Mrs. Vogt had her arrested and presented the case, but through the influence of Mrs. Keegan, who was Carrie's old mistress, a short term in the City Prison was all that Carrie had to suffer.

One day Carrie was released she applied for work to Mrs. Karmaghian, who has an employment bureau. Mrs. Karmaghian employed her as a servant. Carrie could support Mrs. Karmaghian that night, and she was very well pleased. She worked for a few hours later than usual with a feeling much resembling that of Carrie's former mistress. She was at 5 o'clock, but that morning it was after 11 when she got up. She hurried out to the street and found her cash drawer had been tampered with.

Becoming suspicious she looked about and discovered that her mistress had not a cent worth of clothing were gone. She notified the police of the East Fifty-first street station and Carrie was caught. The police were on the case.

On Friday evening, as they were going down town on a Third avenue elevated train, they saw Carrie on the street. They got off at the next station and saw her. She was very nervous and watched for her about the neighborhood, and yesterday afternoon discovered her at the door of a rooming house at 177th street, between Second and Third avenues. Carrie received the detectives with the utmost composure. She said she had been arrested before, but she had never been in prison.
