H. BEERHORN TREES IN THE CHARACTER OF HAMLET.

The tragedy performed at Abbey's in the Haymarket... The performance of Hamlet by H. Beerhorn Trees was a triumph at Abbey's Theatre last night.

The general representation of "Hamlet" in acting and mounting may be rated as good. We have had far better and far worse. The more satisfactory actors were Henry Neville as a King, and the noble dignity with his crown.

The characters in "Madame Sans Gêne" at the Broadway Theatre, make a little different last night from their previous practice. Their language was a better grade of English than before.

A tragedy in a bathtub has to be undertaken, with all its dangers of absurdity, if the assassination of Jean Paul Marat by Charlotte Corday is represented adequately on the stage.

On the contrary, the spectators are duly horrified by the scene, which illustrates the historic event with unerring accuracy. The model sits in a medicated bath, with his cheeks and forehead pale.

Anthony J. Drexel and Philip D. Armour are to be impersonated in "The War of Wealth," a melodrama by Charles T. Dazey, which is to be produced in Philadelphia next Monday.

AMERICAN ART AT THE LOTOS CLUB.
