


THE HUDSON RIVER BRIDGE

PLANS AND GENERAL SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE GREAT STRUCTURE.

The Report of Engineer Theodore Cooper of the Commission Appointed by President Cleveland—The Bridge Must Be of the Finest Materials, with a Clear Span of 3,100 Feet and a Headway Above High Water of 150 Feet—Contractors Will Be Invited to Submit Bids at Once.



THE BRIDGE RECOMMENDED BY ENGINEER COOPER.

At a meeting of the directors of the New York and New Jersey Bridge Company yesterday, held in their office at 214 Broadway. Of the directors the following were present at the meeting: John B. HAS THE MOON A SATELLITE?

THE QUESTION HARVARD'S ASTRONOMERS HOPE TO ANSWER NEXT WEDNESDAY.

The astronomers at the Harvard observatory are making active preparations for the total eclipse of the moon, which will take place on March 10 between 9:30 and 11:37 P. M. Prof. Pickering, Harvard's chief astronomer, and his assistants will be busy watching every phase of the eclipse, and checking the sensitive instruments on the big and costly telephoto-graphic instruments that are scattered at convenient intervals along the hill on which the main observatory building is built.
