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INCOME TAX DECISION.

THE SUPREME COURT SAID TO HAVE TAKEN A VOTE YESTERDAY.

It is Known Positively that the Court is Divided, and it is Rumored that the Majority is Against the Tax—An Extra Session of Congress in Order to Provide Some Other Source of Revenue is Very Likely to Follow an Adverse Decision.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Today was "Constitution Day" in the Supreme Court of the United States, and it is stated on good authority that a vote was taken on the important question involved in the income tax cases.

The occurrence of frequent "leakings" in connection with Supreme Court decisions within the past three months gives an air of credibility to the rumors that the court is divided.

The income tax case will be declared unconstitutional, thus a train of events will follow that no one at this time can clearly foresee.
