

WHOLESALE MATRIMONY BETWEEN THE PANUNUKY AND THE EASTERN CHEROKEES.

The Object is to Infuse New Blood into the Veins of the Bleed Blooded Americans Extant - Negotiations Now Going On.

A modern history of an entire nation of people in search of eligible wives and husbands by the wholesale is just now furnished by the interesting but little known tribe of Panunuky Indians, who live in one of the tidewater eastern counties of Virginia, and are, indeed, the "white families" of the State of that name, being lineal descendants of the true aboriginals. So blue and exclusive, in fact, is the Panunuky blood, so unimixed through centuries with any other strain, that the tribe is dying out by its own hands. The use of the matrimonial alliance with some outside stock to preserve the race, the detrimental effects of inbreeding, and the necessity of introducing fresh blood have become apparent to them, but inasmuch as their negro neighbors, who are in dilemma as to what steps they should take to preserve their race, are in the habit of intermarrying with the white, it is a case like that of the white families of the State of Virginia, where the same result has been reached, and the same remedy has been found.

Under the circumstances the head men of the Panunuky tribe have opened negotiations with the Eastern band of Cherokee Indians in the adjacent State of North Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama to procure brides for their numerous and unmarried daughters. As it seems not probable that before very long aluminum and its light alloys may be available for these classes of construction in which lightness, strength, and durability are the desiderata, it has been considered that a description of the construction of a torpedo boat which we built last year for the French Government might be interesting to the members of this institution, and I have now the pleasure to lay before you a few particulars.

The result of the tests made upon the plates used in the construction of the torpedo boat was a great deal better than we had any right to expect. The plates were of a thickness of 1/4 inch, and were of a strength of 40,000 lbs. per square inch.
