Thanks to Grover Cleveland.

No observer of contemporary events can be blind to the significance of the several remarkable manifestations of the old-fashioned American spirit during the past two years.

Let Mr. CLEVELAND have full credit for his performance in this respect. Whatever else he has done or failed to do, the President has certainly acted as a strong irritant upon the vital forces and loyal passions which are the life of a great nation.

Salvador and Uncle Sam.

It is a striking commentary on the diplomacy of Messrs. CLEVELAND and GRESHAM that while Nicaragua turned first and finally to the United States for help in her trouble with England, the chief honors of the settlement are carried off by Nicaragua's neighbor, Salvador.

A problem so difficult for the CLEVELAND Administration to handle in any satisfactory way, before Corinto was seized, has now been easily solved through the Salvadorean Minister in London.

It is now asserted in Washington that the suggestion to Salvador to put herself forward was made by our Department of State.

Of course, Salvador was powerless to renege or reason with England, while threatening her would have been preposterous.

Salvador is the smallest sovereign State in this hemisphere. In area she is less than New Jersey; in population not equal to Connecticut.

The gratitude of Nicaragua for the United States was worth eliciting from the commanding position she holds on the Isthmus.

Apart from the wisdom of aiding Nicaragua in season, it was highly desirable to avert through skillful dissuasion the deliberate invasion of the soil of an American republic by British armed forces.
