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THE VIGILANT'S NEW KEEL.

RADICAL CHANGES BEING MADE IN THE EX-CUP DEFENDER.

Over Twenty Tons of Lead Ballast Taken from Under Her Cabin Floor and Boiled to Her Keel—A Larger Sail Plan and Rig Than Ever Before—This, It Is Thought, Will Make Her Seven Minutes Faster Over a Thirty-mile Course—The Changes and Running Expenses Will Cost Her, Gould Over \$10,000.

For the past few days the Defender's mishap and the subsequent delay in getting her launched drew every one's attention to Bristol, and for that reason the Vigilant, other than the New York, were forgotten.

While every one knows that Gen. Painé has lengthened and improved the Jubilee, few know that he has done the same for the Vigilant, other than she had received a little larger rig and that the Herreshoffs were making some new sails for her.

When Lord Dunsraven challenged with the new Valkyrie, yachtsmen and the public generally remember that George Gould was the first to come forward with an offer to bear any reasonable proportion of the cost of a new cup defender.

The first move he made was to engage Charles Farr, one of the best of professional sailors as a helmsman. He then had one of his old Tomlin bronze boards made to take the place of the one she lost on the other side, and ordered new and larger spars from Piegrass, as he felt convinced that she must have a larger sail plan to make any sort of a showing against the Defender.

While it was not generally known, the Vigilant's keel was changed by the Herreshoffs from twenty to twenty-five tons of inside ballast. The lead was distributed in pins under the keel in a way that would give her a draft of twenty-five tons.
