

Dr. Hagan's Suicide. A Physician in the Hart's Island Insane Asylum Cuts His Throat.

Dr. Thomas M. Hagan, assistant physician in the insane hospital on Hart's Island, committed suicide on Tuesday night by cutting his throat with a penknife. Dr. Hagan had charge of the patients at the north end of the island, and on Tuesday had been about his duties among them as usual. In the evening he sent word to the main office that he was not feeling well, he would not return to his own room for the night, but would remain at the north end. He occupied a room next to Dr. Brown, another of the island physicians, and went to bed apparently in good spirits.

At 7:15 o'clock yesterday morning Dr. Brown went to his room to call him and found him dead on the bed, with several deep gashes in his throat. The doctor's wounds had also been opened. There was also a stab over the heart. From the position in which the body was found it was evident that Dr. Hagan sat on the edge of the bed before the mirror and gashed his throat several times, cutting the wound on his wrists to make the result certain. The penknife used had a small, thin blade and was not capable of inflicting a large wound. The knife was found on the floor beside the bed, where it had dropped.

When his body was found Dr. Hagan had been dead some hours, so it is probable that the deed was committed shortly after he went to his room. The dead man left no message, and no reason can be assigned for his suicide. Dr. Hagan's friends think that he killed himself during a fit of insanity induced by ill health. Dr. Hagan was a Kentuckian by birth, coming from a small town near Louisville, where his father was a physician. He attended lectures at the New York Polytechnic and was appointed assistant of the post of assistant at Hart's Island last year. It was known among his associates as a quiet and unassuming man. For some time he has been working in preparation for the Regents' medical examination which was held last week.
