

EMPIRE EXPRESS AHEAD.

WE HOLD THE FAST TRAIN RECORD EITHER WAY.

There has been a great deal of figuring over the reports of the time made by the New York Central, and the result is that the Empire Express has been hampered by confusion in the reports telegraphed from Buffalo. It is now said that the true time of arrival in East Buffalo, 436 1/2 miles from the Grand Central Station, was 10 o'clock and 22 minutes and 28 seconds, instead of 12:34:57, as was telegraphed to the railroad.

It is understood that the Grand Central Station is the English station in the Erie Express, and that the record as the time between the start and the finishing moments. If we include the stoppages we beat them 41-100, or practically half a mile, an hour.

Mr. Barattol, general agent here of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad special train run, New York to East Buffalo, has been an official in the Erie Express, and he is the man who has been in the lead in the race.

By comparison you will perceive that the highest rate per mile including stops must be made by the Erie Express, which runs from New York to East Buffalo, and which has a record of 436 1/2 miles in 12:34:57, or 35.4 miles per hour.
