THE HOVA CAPITAL TAKEN.

ANTANANARIVO IS IN THE HANDS OF THE FRENCH.

Flight of the Queen and Her Court Nearly 300 Miles to the South—Terrible Mutilation of the French During the 370 Miles March Which Has Taken Six Months.

Paris, Oct. 8.—The news comes both from Vatovandry, on the east coast of Madagascar, and from Port Louis, Mauritius, that the French forces in Madagascar captured Antananarivo, the capital, on Sept. 27. The Queen, Ratsimilaho, Prince Mampelamb, has taken refuge in Ambositra, in the district of Hellioles, the capital, Antananarivo, having been captured by the French.

The government has not yet received official information of the capture of Antananarivo by the French expeditionary force, but it expects to receive confirmation of the report by the cable. The French troops bombarded the Hova position at Antananarivo on Oct. 3 and captured it on Oct. 4.

There had been a lively contention in the Tenth district for the nomination between friends of Col. Michael C. Murphy, the leader in the First Assembly district, and those of Senator John F. Ahearne, who resides in the Fourth Assembly district.

Ex-Assemblyman William H. Walker supposed that he was slated for the nomination in the Thirteenth district. He got the thirty-nine delegates from his own Assembly district, the Third, but the seventy-five votes of the Fifth Assembly district were cast for ex-Police Justice Thomas F. Martin.
