

MAY ASK TRUMBULL TO RUN

POPULISTS TALKING OF NOMINATING HIM FOR PRESIDENT.

Senator Butler of North Carolina also talked of it. He has been elected as ex-Senator of Illinois non-combatant. CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Llyman Trumbull of this city, who, previous to 1853, was successively Representative in Congress and Justice of the State Supreme Court, and for three terms United States Senator, has been elected to represent Illinois in the Senate for the next term. He is the standard bearer of the Populist party in the Presidential campaign. Although no formal overtures to that effect have been made to him, it is understood that his availability will be canvassed at the meeting of the National Convention of the Populist party, which is to be held at St. Louis on Friday next to decide on the time and place for holding the National Convention.

The only other name which is likely to be called of that of United States Senator Marion Butler of North Carolina, who has been elected to represent Nebraska in the light of his record. Beyond the three men no others have been mentioned as the nominee of the party for President.

A National Committee from a far Western State, who was in this city this afternoon, said: "We do not propose to be placed again in the dilemma that is a part of the history of the Omaha Convention of 1892. Then, so certain were our leaders that Judge Graham would accept the nomination that no other name was suggested. It was only after the convention had adjourned that it was ascertained that the nomination was regarded as certain that the committee we had labored with him in Indiana would succeed in obtaining consent to the presentation of his name. It can be said now, and I think for the first time, that the immediate members of the committee are strongly in favor of his placing himself in our hands, and that, so far as he himself was concerned, his objections were more personal than political.

It will be remembered that we convened and adjourned, reconvened and again adjourned, talked and sang to the end, and did not give up until the committee had refused to accept Judge Graham. Then we were in a quandary. Somebody had to be nominated, and the choice fell upon Judge Graham.

This time we propose to look ahead and to know just where we stand, without waiting until the committee has refused to accept. We believe that either Judge Trumbull or Senator Butler would be acceptable to only the Populist party. The information that his name was being seriously spoken of in connection with the Populist party, was given to the committee by Judge Trumbull this evening. Beside the fact that he has run for President in the past, mentally and as active physically as the average man of 60. He said that he had long since decided to retire from public life, and that he would not be a candidate for President.

THE MARRYING AGE.

One Explanation of an Inequality in the Sexes Shown by the Last Census.

The discovery has been made by prosaic and unromantic statisticians in town that according to the recent Board of Health census there are about 13,000 more women in New York than men. The difference is much greater, the women numbering over 24,000 more than the men. There were returned by this census 96,000 men between the ages of 20 and 25 and 120,000 women.

This apparent discrepancy—a discrepancy which, in cold frankness, it must be admitted is rather mathematical than real—is explained by the fact that in all countries in which a census of the inhabitants is taken there appears to be a large preponderance of women during the period popularly accepted as the marrying age. It would probably be ungracious to say that any young or middle-aged woman would be willing to confuse the records of official enumerators and to discredit their accuracy by understating her age, especially if it be upward of thirty. The excess of female over male population in New York is, as before stated, 13,000; but the excess between the two sexes is almost exactly equal up to and including the age of 15. Of 25,000 children returned by the last census, at least 12,000 were girls. The time when it was taken, the disparity between the two sexes was just 57. Of children between 20 and 25, there were 120,000 girls and 87,000 boys.
