

WRONGS OF THE CHILDREN.

A FEW CASES FROM THE LAST REPORT OF THE GERRY SOCIETY.

A daughter of Brookhaven—Four Pickpockets—Crime Instigated by the World—Case of a Child in Chinatown.

In the twenty-first annual report of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children there is much to interest any student of social conditions. In the insight given into the causes and effects of vice and crime in children. To rescue children from contaminating influences and unfit surroundings is the avowed work of the society.

In the performance of this work we have succeeded to a great power, and the report is, in part at least, intended as a justification of the exercise of such powers. Fifty-two cases are described as typical of the 8,523 cases investigated during the year.

As one looks at the record of crimes committed against the helpless children of the poor, it would seem that more stringent measures were necessary to lessen successfully these offenses. Corporal punishment has been suggested on account of its deterrent effect.

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1,645 of these were committed, and 1,816 found to be improper cases, thus leaving to the city and county of New York, at the per capita amount of \$1.04 per annum, the sum of \$1,816,540.

The principal subjects considered by the society there were 423 cases of cruelty, 193 cases of begging and peddling, 809 cases of disorderly conduct, 28 runaway children, 840 unprovoked assaults, 1,004 cases of vagrancy. Pictures of two children about whom nothing is known, and who were found abandoned by the street, are included in the report.

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NAVAL ACADEMY CHANGES.

THE PLAN TO MOVE THE SCHOOL FROM ANNAPOLIS TO NEWPORT.

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
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
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KATE LEE (Aged 9 years).




PAULINE COHEN (Aged 10 years).
