CLEVELAND, May 23.—The Rev. Dr. Buckley, Chairman of the Committee on Episcopacy at the Methodist Conference, presented a report this morning saying that the committee had carefully examined into the charges preferred by the Rev. Dr. C. Bowditch against Bishop Fowler, Fitzgerald, and Warren.
