POSONA, Cal., June 18.—The Gold Miners' Association of California has reason to believe that some 1,500 men are climbing over mountains, scaling peaks, wandering through cañons, searching over burning desert wastes, and traversing old river beds in California and Arizona this season, prospecting for gold-bearing rock or dirt that may be profitably mined.

Since February over 800 men of all ages from twenty to sixty-five have gone from Los Angeles to spend seven or eight months searching for gold, and over 800 have started out for the mountains from Phoenix, Ariz., since March.

The season for prospecting in California opens early in March, and continues until the end of the summer, some time in November. Some prospectors begin their work in the spring, and others in the fall.
