

COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED.

Two Men and a Woman Collared with the Use of Apparatus. The police of the East Twenty-second street station made known yesterday the facts of a capture of counterfeiters which they made within the past week.

These arrested are William Knapp, 34 years old; his wife, Lottie, 10 years old; and Thomas Fagan, 10 years old. The place in which they carried on their counterfeiting was a back room on the top floor of a lodging house at 233 East Twenty-third street.

This was on last Saturday. They waited in front of the house and arrested Knapp when he entered. They searched him and found fifteen counterfeit fifty-cent pieces and a bad quarter. He continued their watch on the house, and on Tuesday arrested Knapp's wife when she entered. They searched her and found fifteen counterfeit dollars and a bad quarter.
