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LIVE WASHINGTON TOPICS.

ELECTORAL VOTES RECEIVED FROM ALL THE STATES BY MAIL.

Messengers Yet to Arrive from Sixteen States. WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The electoral votes were formally delivered to Vice-President Stevenson to-day by Thomas Stansfield of Charleston. The votes of the various States are arriving at the Capitol every day, as the law requires that they shall all be delivered to the Vice-President at Washington by next Monday. If it should happen that any of the votes are missing on that day, it becomes the duty of the Vice-President to send a special messenger to the delinquent State, ascertaining the cause of the delay and to procure a certified copy of the returns. The law provides that one copy of the vote shall be forwarded to Washington by mail, and a duplicate copy delivered to the Vice-President in person by a special messenger designated by the State.

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DR. TINKER WAKES UP TO FIND HIMSELF A JUDGMENT DEBTOR FOR \$50,000.

Dr. Charles A. Tinker of 124 West 121st street, who was arrested on an execution against the person on the judgment of \$50,000 obtained against him by Frederick L. Colwell, a broker, for alienating the affection of Genevieve B. Colwell, moved before Justice Andrews of the Supreme Court yesterday to open the judgment, which was rendered on default because of the remissness of his counsel, Dr. Tinker, who was put in Ludlow street jail on Wednesday afternoon, declared that he intended to defend the case and that he had a good defense.

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ENGINEERS AT CROTON DAM.

TWO HUNDRED VISITORS INSPECT THE OPERATIONS. Greatly interested in the vast reservoir, which is being built at Croton, N. Y., a party of two hundred engineers and other visitors inspected the operations of the dam on Monday. The dam is being built by the Croton Aqueduct Company. The reservoir will have a total height of 280 feet, of which only the top 50 feet will be the true reservoir-forming part of the dam. The dam will be 200 feet wide at the base and 24 at the crest. Its length, with the embankment at the south end, will be 4,000 feet. It will contain 200,000,000 cubic feet of masonry. The dam will have a capacity of 30,000,000 gallons, which is about equal to the combined capacity of the nine dams now erected. About 30,000 cubic yards of the masonry of the main structure are laid, and the work seems scarcely started. Over 1,000,000 cubic yards of excavation have been made. It is estimated that 75,000 cubic yards more will finish this portion of the work. In keeping the excavation dry, about 4,500,000 gallons of water a day is pumped into the temporary channel which has been blasted out and walled in on both sides. The length of which will be 1,000 feet, is partly completed.

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
