A PROPHECY FULFILLED.

Worked for 800 Years—It Was Fulfilled and Been Fulfilled in This Century—The Last Prophecy of the Old Testament.

Some persons have gone so far as to say that the "prophecies" of the Old Testament were written after the events that they "foretold."

In the first place, the earldom of Mar is very old. The British House of Lords, having done some book-work, has discovered that in 1800 a writ was granted to a person that all the Scots lawyers said was not entitled to it, in 1885 reconsidered their motion to some extent, and confirmed the title upon the rightful claimant.

The original earldom was very wealthy, so much so that the crown of Scotland seized upon its lands whenever it could. From about 1435 to 1505 the crown held the lands, and four years after the Scottish kings were created earls of Mar; but in each case the crown was in after years the grants were declared to have been "inept."

Now comes in the prophecy, which is attributed to Thomas the Rhymer, or the Blind Boy of Cumbankennet, or to the regular household poet or bard. It was taken down in writing in 1710, as follows:

"Froud Chief of Mar: Thou shalt be raised still higher, until thou sittest in the place of the king. Thou shalt rule and destroy, and thou shalt be after Mr. Stewart."

Now for the way this has worked out. In 1571 and 1572 the Earl of Mar was present of the House of Commons, and in 1573 he was elected a member of the House of Commons.
