A SMALL STRIKE REPORTED IN CONSOLIDATED VIRGINIA.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

SEATTLE, May 29.—A group of nineteen claims near Nicola, a station of the Canadian Pacific Railway, fifty-three miles east of Vancouver, B. C., has been leased to the British Columbia Development Co. for \$30,000.

At Kureka camp on the Colville reservation the surface ore assays from \$10 to \$150 per ton gold. The mine is situated on a hillside of 300 feet on the dump ridge for shipment.

A crushing of eighty-nine tons of ore from the Wisconsin mine, near Grass Valley, Nevada, was sold at auction for \$100,000.

In the Good Time mine, Yuba county, has been struck a large shoot of rich ore in a ledge nearly twelve feet wide. A run of four days with the first stamp mill yielded \$15,000.
