

DOWN TAMMANY, THEIR CRY. BIG MEETING OF THE PURROY HOME RULE DEMOCRACY.

Red-Hot Orator, Directed at John C. Sheehan, His Two Faces, His Lures for Labor and the German Vote—Purroy, Gay, and the McKenna Committee—89 Districts Organized.

The General Committee of the Home Rule Democracy, which recognizes County Clerk Henry D. Purroy as its leader, met last night at 101st street, in sixth avenue, near Forty-second street, in a room in the Hotel Hamilton.

There were 1,500 cheering Purroyites crowded into the hall, and more would have been there had there been room. It was a bigger and more enthusiastic meeting than the recent gathering of the Tammany Hall General Committee.

Henry Murray presided and made a short speech, in which he said that the organization was ready to unite with all good citizens who are in favor of the Home Rule Democracy.

After reaffirming all that was said against Tammany Hall in the resolutions adopted last Friday at the meeting presented by the County Clerk last night.

That in the opinion of this General Committee the present municipal administration is a disgrace to the city of New York.

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A FIRM STAND FOR GREECE. ENGLAND'S ULTIMATUM AGAINST TURKEY'S KEEPING THESSALY.

LONDON, June 10.—The Sun's correspondent in this city has received private advices from Constantinople which enable him to confirm, without reservation, the news cabled to The Sun of England's declaration regarding the retrocession to Turkey of the Grecian province of Thessaly.

The announcement that England would not consent to Thessaly's being again placed under Turkish rule was made by Sir Philip Currie, the British Ambassador, to Tewfik Pasha, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, in the presence of M. Neldoff, the Russian Ambassador, on May 22.

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
