

NEW GOLD DISCOVERIES.

THE WORK OF A PROSPECTING PARTY SENT OUT LAST YEAR.

Very Rich Finds Around the Headwaters of the Peace River in Canada—Reports from There Say That There Will Be a Klondike District—Numerous Places Discovered.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 27.—Among the miners who are outfitting here for the Klondike is Mr. M. T. Fitzgerald. Replying to an inquiry about the Northwest Territories, he said: "The Klondike is but a speck on the map of that great gold country. Last season I spent six months in the Peace River country in the interest of the Forty-third Mining Company of Ottawa, going in the capacity of a prospector. Our exploring party included thirty-one men and sixty-three horses. Ashcroft, British Columbia, on the Canadian Pacific Railroad, was the starting point, thence over the Cariboo wagon road to the Quinnella River, 220 miles. Crossing Upper Fraser River, we traveled northwesterly, following the old telegraph trail to Stewart Lake, stopping at Fort St. James, distant 200 miles from Quinnella, and 430 miles from Ashcroft.
