THE CRUISER WILMINGTON PREVENTS THE TUG FROM SLIPPING OUT TO SEA.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—A Jacksonville, Fla., dispatch received here to-night says: "Much excitement was caused here about 3 P. M. to-day by the roar of a gun from the cruiser Wilmington. The warship had fired a blank shot at the tug Dauntless to compel her to stop."
