HAS A DOLLAR DATED 1804.

FELIX DELOS BOUGHT IT IN CANAL STREET FOR \$100.

Having heard in the Sun of the Fancy Price put by numismatists on the Two or Three Dollars with That Date That Are Rare, He Would Like to Sell it to the Government.

Another 1804 dollar has turned up. While collectors have been offering prices ranging around \$2,000 for specimens of this coin, and numismatists have been discussing orally and verbally the problem of what has become of the 20,000 silver dollars struck in 1804...

As to the genuineness of the coin, only an expert would be qualified to give an opinion, and not very many experts, for comparatively few have seen an 1804 dollar. This one was in an excellent state of preservation, slightly darkened, as if from the action of sulphur, but as clear and clean of out as a coin of the present year.

For about two years Mr. Delos, who is a collector of all kinds of coins, has been particularly anxious to get the 1804 dollar.

"This might be in your line," said the proprietor, showing him the coin.



LAMBERT'S DEATH NEAR.

Physicians say he cannot outlive To-day—Mrs. Lambert Recovering Slowly from the Shock of Her Experience with the Masked Robbers—More About the Suspected Man Willis.

WILSON, Conn., Dec. 19.—The wonderful vitality of David S. R. Lambert, who was shot by masked robbers on Friday night, has astonished the three physicians who are in attendance. Although his condition has not improved in the least since he was found by his door, a little nourishment and several doses of brandy have been administered.

The room in which the shooting occurred runs through the house, with doors at the north and south ends. It is fifty feet long. Mr. Lambert's body was found against the south door, which was of the old-fashioned pattern divided in the middle. The upper part was found open by Mrs. Bell, who was the first person to enter the house after the shooting.
