

MEETING OF THE BOOTHS.

NO STEPS TO UNIT VOLUNTEERS AND SALVATION ARMY.

Two Clergymen Present Who Give Out a Brief Statement of What Happened—An Agreement That Public Controversy Shall Be Brought to an End as Far as Possible.

William Booth, "General" of the Salvation Army, and the Rev. Dr. Charles Lusted Hall, President of United Brethren, met at the Windsor Hotel yesterday afternoon. The meeting took place in Room 14, on the main floor of the hotel.

The interview was purely as between father and son. Nothing transpired calculated to lead to an agreement between the two movements.

It was agreed that all public controversy, in the press or otherwise, should be brought to an end as far as possible, come to an end.

Before the meeting ended it was agreed between the principals that neither should submit to be interviewed after the meeting was over and that the above statement should be the only report of the interview given to the press.

The meeting was to have taken place at the Park Avenue Hotel at noon. This was made known by a notice in the Herald and the Tribune.

William Booth did not finally consent to these terms until after Dr. Strong had left on Saturday morning for the Grand Army of the Republic.

Marital law is being strictly enforced. The Government controls the situation, and Gen. Arolas and Col. Pakleri are showing great energy against the enemies of peace and public order.

Since Saturday night the press censorship in Havana has been very stringent. The newspapers regarding the outbreaks are allowed to be sent by direct cable.
