

CUBA IN THE ASSEMBLY.

TWO RESOLUTIONS FAVORING BELLIGERENCY ARE DISCUSSED.

A substitute adopted expressing sympathy with the patriots, and denouncing the atrocious conduct of the Spanish Government in Spain after the Gas Complot.

Speeches in favor of the belligerency resolutions were made by their introducers and by Messrs. Donnelly and Phillips (Dem., N. Y.).

Mr. Perkins (Rep., Monroe) said that the Cuban question was without the province of the Legislature. It has no more right to instruct Congress than Congress would have to instruct the Legislature on New York affairs.

Mr. Armstrong (Rep., Monroe) advised the Democrats, if their sympathies were so acutely aroused, to subscribe to the cause part of their salaries for this week.

Mr. Charles (Dem., N. Y.) retorted that Tammany had already subscribed \$20,000 for that purpose. He assured his colleagues that Cuba would be free before June 1, and said that the concession of belligerent rights would terminate the struggle in short order.

Mr. Kelley said that his resolution covered the same ground as the others in expressing the sympathy of the people of the State with the Cuban cause, and stopped short of instructing Congress as to its course.

The substitute was adopted, 71 to 60, all three of the City, including Mr. Seligman, who is a Democrat, voting with the Republicans.

JERSEY AND OUR TAX LAWS.

MEMORIAL TO THE LEGISLATURE ON THE NEW YORK TAX COMMISSIONERS.

TRENTON, Jan. 24.—The fight between New Jersey and New York over the corporations has been renewed in the Legislature. A bill was introduced to-night rendering it unnecessary for corporations organized under the laws of New Jersey to set forth in their certificates of incorporation the location of their business.
