Febring was the first to see the eagle. He was looking at the nest, and he saw the eagle as it came down. He was so startled that he dropped his gun. The eagle landed on the ground, and he started up the tree. He was so frightened that he did not know what to do.

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WINDMOELLER'S REZEE.

A Well-Known German-American Assumed on the Street in Dallas, Tex.

DALLAS, Tex., June 6.—Frederick Windmoeller, the well-known German-American editor, teacher and orator, was waylaid and killed with an axe at midnight last night, while he was returning from a patriotic picnic at South Park suburb, given by the local organization of German veterans of the Franco-Prussian war.

When his wife and her mother reached him they found him dead. A gash from an axe blade had been made in the forehead between the eyes. A similar wound was under the left ear.

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TRANSPORT BOARD'S SHARP MOVE.

It Adroitly Attempts to Shift Responsibility Upon Mayor Van Wyck.

The action of the Rapid Transit Commission in appointing Mayor Van Wyck as Controller of the Rapid Transit Commission, with President Alexander E. Orr to determine the amount of compensation the Manhattan Company should pay for the West street extension franchise is disapproved by Russell Sage. He said yesterday:

The appointment of Mayor Van Wyck and Comptroller Coler with Mr. Orr upon a Compensation Committee is an attempt to throw the responsibility of a reasonable rate upon the Mayor and Comptroller and is unwarranted. The taxpayers of this city have been treated abominably by the commission, which has spent \$450,000 of the people's money and has accomplished nothing. It has dilapidated its time and money in an attempt to get a franchise for transportation which is not feasible on account of lack of funds for some time to come, and the only other remedy is for Manhattan to increase its facilities under the present franchise.
