

ORR IS WRITING STILL. TRANSPORT BOARD SENDS ANOTHER LETTER TO MR. GOULD.

Mr. Orr is writing still. The Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners announced yesterday that President Alexander Orr had been authorized by it to send the following letter to George J. Gould, President of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad Company, in reference to the proposed extension of the elevated system:

1. The Obligation to Construct. The board is of the opinion that the obligation to construct upon the surrender of the privilege proposed to be received to the board of the right to interfere with the construction of the proposed extension of the elevated system.

2. Grade Crossings. The board also observes that the grade crossings of the elevated system are at grade, provided the power be exercised upon this your company to make such additional crossings as may be necessary to meet the varying demands of its traffic.

3. Interference with Other Rapid Transit. It is the policy of the board that the stations of the elevated system should be so located as to avoid interference with the operation of other rapid transit systems.

4. Details. Your company accedes to our suggestions in the maximum distance to be secured upon in advance. The board accepts this proposal in full and will proceed to issue orders to that effect.

14. Delay of Municipal Authorities. This board cannot accept the proposal that you should be permitted to locate columns of the proposed extension of the elevated system on streets or avenues except by the special approval of the board.

15. Right of the Board to Intervene. Upon this board you state that your company will not be a party to any litigation which may be instituted by the board of the right to intervene for the sake of expediting any litigation which, under the terms of the proposed extension, may be instituted by the board.

16. Delay of Municipal Authorities. This board cannot accept the proposal that you should be permitted to locate columns of the proposed extension of the elevated system on streets or avenues except by the special approval of the board.

17. Right of the Board to Intervene. Upon this board you state that your company will not be a party to any litigation which may be instituted by the board of the right to intervene for the sake of expediting any litigation which, under the terms of the proposed extension, may be instituted by the board.
