BANK HAS A NEW PRESIDENT. Mechanics and Traders' Pays All Claims on Demand and Will Keep It Up.

Fernando Baltes retired yesterday from the Presidency of the Mechanics and Traders' Bank at Broadway and Broome street, and was succeeded by Leo Schlesinger, formerly Vice-President.

Published reports of the expected change caused a run on the bank, chiefly, it is said, by small depositors, with a withdrawal in all of possibly \$250,000.

The Clearing House Committee, it announced, stood ready to back up the bank in meeting all demands upon it, and sent up \$100,000, it was said, for that purpose.

Over \$500,000 in cash was taken from the bank, the directors made this statement in the evening.

As to the withdrawal to-day by depositors who were needlessly alarmed, every demand was met, and the bank closed the day's business with a satisfactory balance on hand.

The bank will open its doors tomorrow morning fully prepared to meet every possible demand, and any depositor who wishes to draw his money to-morrow or Monday or later has only to apply for it.

We must confess, however, to a feeling of almost satisfaction that more than \$100,000 was deposited by certain customers of the bank, the fact that our bank has been able to withstand so severe a pressure at almost a moment's notice, and is now prepared to meet every demand, is sufficient evidence of both its stability and its standing in this mercantile city.

At noon yesterday eight of the fifteen directors assembled at the regular Friday meeting of the bank at 237 Broadway, also attended by the Japanese Bank Company, 519 Broadway.

ACTOR DIES IN A CELL. He Had Been Found Drunk in the Street—His Death Due to Intemperance. James A. Pollock, 52 years old, an actor of 139 Fourth avenue, was found apparently drunk at Park row and New Chambers street by Policeman Balister last night. The policeman took him to the Oak street station and he was put in a cell. Two hours later Pollock was found unconscious by the doorman, and Dr. Dodge of the Hudson Street Hospital was summoned. Pollock died in a few minutes of alcohol poisoning.

The man had a G. E. medal and papers showing that he had enlisted in the Sixteenth New York Volunteers in 1862 and had been discharged in 1865. There was a letter from Mr. H. B. of Amsterdam, N. Y., calling Pollock's name and saying that Pollock had run away with Polk's wife.

Pollock died in the Hazel Wood Company at Columbia, Pa., during a one week's stand in September, and as late as Oct. 3 was with the company.
