WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The presentation in the Senate this morning of a memorial from a Confederate post in Florida opposing the proposition to pension Confederate soldiers was made the text of some remarks by Mr. Allen (Pop. Neb.), who said:

"I do not suppose there ever was a serious purpose on the part of the Senator from North Carolina (Mr. Butler) who offered the amendment to pension Confederate soldiers. I think that the author of that proposed amendment was simply, like the President of the United States, carried away by enthusiasm.
