WILL VOTE ON TUESDAY.

THE SENATE AGREES TO ACT ON THE MCKEY RESOLUTION.

It Declares the Occupation of the Philippines to be Temporary Only, Pending the Establishment of a Stable Government—A Lively Debate on Expansion.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—In the Senate to-day a bill was introduced by Mr. Hoar (Rep., Mass.) and referred to the Committee on Territories and Elections, amending the existing law as to the election of United States Senators by providing that after seven ballots on as many days the person receiving a plurality on the next ballot shall be declared elected.

The resolution offered yesterday by Mr. Allen (Rep., Neb.), reaffirming the doctrine of the Declaration of Independence, that all men are created equal and that governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed, and that the doctrine is of universal applicability, was taken up.

Mr. Chandler (Rep., N. H.) inquired as to the motive of taking up the resolution, and without waiting for an answer moved that all the pending resolutions as to expansion—those of Senators Bacon, Sullivan, McEnery and Allen—should be taken up on Monday next at 3 o'clock and should be voted on seriatim, the Senate to sit till midnight for that purpose if necessary.

Mr. Allen inquired whether the Senate was not ready to vote on a resolution that would merely reaffirm the doctrine of the Declaration of Independence.

Mr. Stewart (Pop., Neb.) intimated that he would like to have some reasons given as to why the resolution should be adopted.

Mr. Allen declined that idea and saw no objection to the ratification of the treaty and the Declaration of Independence.
