

THREE MEN ON AN ICE SEA.

GREENPORT GUNNERS WHO DRIFFED AWAY.

Caught Their Boat and Held It Fast Within Talking Distance of Shore—Then They Shot and Fought Their Way to the Boat with Apparently Frozen Immates.

GREENPORT, I. I., Feb. 14.—Twenty men in the steamer Tieddie were searching for Peck, Grant and Gardner's bay, for three gunners who were caught in a boat in the ice in the force storm of the 11th.

At 7 o'clock in the evening, Capt. Tutthill and Mr. H. J. Smith, a dozen cartridges and four lead ducks were found on the dock. By a rope was led to the westward from the dock to the vessel of the gunners could be made out.

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PUMPING THE GERMANIC OUT.

She Is on the Bottom at Her Pier with 18 Inches of Water in Her Main Saloon.

The wrecking tug Manhattan, Capt. Tucker, had the job of pumping out the White Star line steamship Germanic yesterday. The steamship took in so much water through an open coal port at her dock on Monday night that she was forced to leave the pier.

She got here on Saturday and had been discharging cargo ever since. Late on Monday she began taking on coal. She had come in with a list to starboard, and it was aggravated by the removal of cargo and the loading with coal.

In the hold of the vessel there remained about 100 tons of undischarged cargo. Decks, stowage and hold were covered by from one to four feet of ice and snow, the weight of which rendered the equilibrium of the ship more unstable.

About 9:20 o'clock a squall came up the river, eddying under the promenade and hurricane deck, and literally blew the ship over. From a decided list to starboard she acted before the committee.

Ever since the committee was appointed Chairman Fallows has been in receipt of letters containing the charges of irregularity relative to the administration of the Surrogate's office.

These have been unquestioned irregularity and have been the subject of serious consideration. One letter received yesterday makes severe charges against certain officials, the nature of which will only be known when public hearings have been held.

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MR. FALLOWS'S INQUIRY.

FRESH CHARGES MADE REGARDING THE SURROGATE'S OFFICE.

Complainant Sent to the Investigating Committee—More Charges Made by the Hold-Facts for Gov. Roosevelt.

ALBANY, Feb. 14.—The final report of the committee appointed by the Assembly to investigate the Tammany administration of the Surrogate's office of New York County promises to be much more interesting than the preliminary report already submitted to the Legislature.

The general belief that the resignation of Surrogate Arnold would put an end to the investigation, Chairman Fallows of the committee told a SEN reporter more than a week ago that this was a mistake, and that the inquiry is not over will appear clearly to-morrow what his views are on the members of the committee and inform them that additional and somewhat surprising.

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CANAL BILL IN THE HOUSE.

OFFERED AS AN AMENDMENT TO THE SUNDRY CIVIL BILL.

A Passage at Arms Between Mr. Hepburn and Mr. Cannon Over the Nicaragua Canal Bill—Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, in Charge of the Bill, Made the Point of Order Against It That Under the Rules of the House Regulating the Consideration of Appropriation Bills It Was Inadmissible. WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The Nicaragua Canal bill, as reported by Mr. Hepburn (Rep., Ia.) before the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, was proposed by him this afternoon as an amendment to the Sundry Civil bill, now under consideration in the House.
