

NEW ORDEAL FOR MOLINEUX

HIS CASE ORDERED FOR A THIRD TIME BEFORE A GRAND JURY.

The District Attorney's Office Attacks the May Grand Jury in Open Court, and Col. Church, Its Foreman, is Reprimanded with Categorical Contradiction of Osborne.

In pursuance of an order of Justice Furman of the Supreme Court, the case of Roland B. Molineux, charged with the murder of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams, will be submitted to the Grand Jury to be sworn in on the first Monday in July.

Justice Furman had, on the motion of Assistant District Attorney Osborne, ordered Molineux's counsel to show cause yesterday why Justice Furman should not order the case to be resubmitted.

On the return of the order Mr. Osborne renewed his attack upon Col. William C. Church, the foreman of the May Grand Jury, and upon the members of the May Grand Jury, charging that they were influenced improperly.

"The Judge in Part I. of the General Sessions—and I want it understood at the outset that I do not want to criticize him—said in his charge that the case should be first submitted to a Grand Jury, and then to the court. Now, the case against Molineux did not come within any of those exceptions of the Judge, who further said the system of submitting cases to Magistrates was a wise and well-ordered system, which should not be departed from save for good and sufficient reasons.

The Grand Jury had two things to do—to find an indictment and shatter it well-ordered system, or to dismiss the indictment. Under the charge the only thing to be done was to obey the Court and find no indictment. We made infinitely stronger cases than before the first Grand Jury, and I would be willing to offer my Honor back into the exhibit for I feel sure you would in a few minutes decide that the defendant is guilty.

The District Attorney directed that the foreman be called to the stand and put questions calculated not to find Molineux guilty, but to have a direct tendency to show that Mrs. Rogers and Harry Cornish entered into a conspiracy to bring about the conviction of the defendant. These questions were irrelevant and the District Attorney told the foreman that he could not take up two cases at once.

The foreman then told me he had decided not to take up the case against Molineux until I had proved Cornish not guilty."
