

HILLIS QUOTES CORWIN.

THOMAS G. SHEARMAN DIFFERS FROM HIM ABOUT THE OFFICE. S. V. White corrects Mr. Shearman's History and Patriotism, and Things Are Approaching Turbulence When Pastor Hillis Interjects a Hymn and Restores Peace.

In a warm discussion over just how great a man Tom Corwin of Ohio was, and the inquiry of righteousness of the war in the Philippines, the members of the Plymouth Church in Brooklyn forgot the subject of their regular weekly prayer meeting last night. The subject provided by the Rev. Newell D. Hillis was the forgiveness of enemies and the forgetting of injuries sustained through them. The mention of the name of Tom Corwin by Dr. Hillis, during the course of his remarks, led Thomas G. Shearman to draw a parallel between Corwin's opposition to the Mexican War, and the opposition of certain persons to-day to the war in the Philippines, taking the ground that Corwin was a man with the courage of his convictions and should be an example to encourage the young men of to-day to stand out boldly against the Administration.

Dr. Hillis, after the conclusion of the meeting, went on to say that all men who had at all strong personalities were bound to have enemies. He said that men who never made enemies and went through their lives in absolute harmony were of no use to the rest of the world and were better off dead than alive. He gave many illustrations of enemies that were never forgiven, mentioning among them the bitterness between Blaine and Conkling, which he said, prevented both men from ever realizing their ambitions. The forgiveness of enemies was said to be one of the hardest of the duties in human life, and it was in closing that Dr. Hillis gave the case of Tom Corwin as an illustration of a man who was a man of brilliant and rare genius, he said, and in Congress, in his opposition to the Mexican War, and in his opposition to the American army would be welcomed to hostilities in Mexico.
