

COUNTESS TALKS AGAIN.

GOSPEL YACHT'S OWNER ADDRESSES AN ANTI-SALOON MEETING.

Tells More About Her Work Among the Fishermen of the Baltic and its Hardships—Has Received Less Than \$1,000 for the Yacht—Says She Will Not Give It Up.

COUNTESS ADELINA SCHIMMELMANN, the owner of the gospel yacht Dues, set aside yesterday her determination not to appear in public until her health and material fortune had recovered themselves from overexertion in the evangelization of the world, and spoke at a "demonstration against the saloon" which was held at Carnegie Hall under the auspices of the American Anti-Saloon League.

The Countess was accompanied by her adopted son, Count Paul Frederick Schimmelmann. She was apparently taller than the Rev. Dr. Chapman. She was dressed in a plain black gown. In her talk the Countess said things intimating that she was at least thirty years old, but she looks younger.

She began by telling the story of her early life at the Baltic, including a court dinner she attended when she was about 3 years old. She was brought up, she said, so that she never knew what care or trouble meant.

The Countess then told how she came a shelper on one of these islands and undertook to improve the conditions of the people. She found them miserably poor, none too well fed at any time and nearly starving to death when they went out to work.

She said she had the most profitable business of the island was that of brandy selling. She had to buy the brandy from the people who regarded her as an intruder and an enemy.

Want a Pastor and a Building for the University Heights Collegiate Church.

Members of the church complained of the clergymen who have preached there in the past and at the delay of the Consistory in selecting a successor to the Rev. Dr. Sehnock. They went to Chancery MacCracken, who carried their protest to the Consistory.

The Weather. The storm from Kansas was passing over the Mississippi States into the lake region yesterday, with rain in the Tennessee and Ohio valleys, the lake region, Pennsylvania and northern New York, and scattered snow in the Central and upper Mississippi Valley States, where there were threatening conditions in the Atlantic States. The temperature was falling rapidly in the Northwest and the cold was spreading southward with freezing weather touching northern Texas; it remained cold in the New England States, where the temperature was between freezing point by 10 to 15 degrees. In this city the day was raw and threatening; the wind shifted from the north to southeast; average velocity, 15 miles an hour; average humidity, 81 per cent; barometer, corrected to sea level, at 3:00 P. M., 30.45; 3 P. M., 30.42. The temperature as recorded by the official thermometer, and also by the Rev. B. M. S. thermometer at the street level, is shown in the annexed table.
