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ABOLISH DEATH PENALTY?

GEN. N. M. CURTIS SAYS THE STATE IS BOUND TO COME TO IT.

Law May Not Be Passed This Year or Next, But a Successful Move in That Direction Would Not Surprise Him at Any Time—Why He Is Against Capital Punishment.

Gen. Newton Martin Curtis, the leader of the movement for the abolition of capital punishment in this country, is quite confident that the State will not eliminate capital punishment from its criminal code.

At every session of the Legislature from 1848 to 1850 he introduced a bill embodying his idea. In 1850 the bill passed the Assembly, but was not allowed to reach a vote in the Senate.
