PRIZE-FIGHTING IN VIRGINIA. "Manly Defense" Exhibitions Legalized in a Bill Introduced Recently. THE PLAGUE IN SAN FRANCISCO. One Genuine Case in Chinatown—No Fear Felt of Its Spreading. This decision was reached late last night after hearing the testimony of the Federal quarantine officer, Dr. Kinyoun. His diagnosis was confirmed in by several other physicians.
