## TOTTEN'S DREAM OF WAR.

MADE PUBLIC IN 1880. IT APPLIES NOW TO CHINA.

The Dream Occurred in 1872 and Secretary Ramsay in 1880 Published It—Pictorial How China Could Eat Up a Horde Fighting Against Her and Could Come Out Supreme. C. A. L. Totten, formerly Lieutenant of the United States Army, and as such detailed to Yale as Professor of Military Science, as long ago as 1862, foretold the war that is marking the close of the century. His Biblical researches along the lines of chronology have led him to study the political future of the nations. He views the troubles in China with intense anxiety. Mr. Totten believes that all things tend toward the carrying out of the prophecies of the Bible. Regarding the "Boxer" uprising he said to a New reporter: "It is impossible to forecast the outcome of this uprising. The present crisis is one of the most remarkable of the modern world and has ever been called upon to face. We have steadily encroached upon the Celestial Empire, demanding concessions to our commerce, and quite as steadily have we closed our ports to reprobation. We have never followed the Golden Rule in our intercourse, for there has been nothing mutual in this communion. "Now, it stands to reason that in a nation of 400,000,000 of people, opened against their will and traditions by the encroachment of a miscellaneous body of uninvited and dis-sensitized missionaries and competing merchants, while the home governments have discriminated against Chinese immigrants, a strong party should arise whose natural determination is to drive back the wedge that threatens the integrity of the Empire. It would be a surprising thing indeed if no patriotic home party should forth to defend those ancient institutions which must be quite as dear to that vast people as our own are to ourselves. Consequently this uprising is indeed a serious one in its own possibilities. "China was centuries old before her walls were ever seen by Occidentals. Had we Western people never encroached thereon there might not yet have arisen any reason for the distant gaze of that Empire, and it could have gone on in its own way as long again. "But now all is different; we have entered the Celestial precincts, and of course a strong reactionary home party has stood up to resist further invasions. Hence the whole world is in a strange predicament the entire West against the East. All the eagles are already gathered about the most ancient carcass of empire that the world contains. The military
