

BRYAN FOR THE LAST TIME.

BROOKLYN AND THE EAST SIDE HEAR HIS STALLED SPEECHES.

William Jennings Bryan was enthusiastically greeted in Brooklyn last night, where he made eight speeches in the territory extending from the Bleecker street entrance to the Academy of Music.
