

TAXATION BILLS PASSED.

SENATOR KRUM'S THREE MEASURES GO THROUGH THE SENATE.

The 34 Republicans Voted for All of Them. Senator Traylor voted for the Bill taxing Savings Banks. Introduced by the Bureau of Elections.

ALBANY, Feb. 27.—The Senate today passed Governor's three bills, recommended by Gov. Odell, taxing savings banks and insurance and trust companies.

The insurance bill was passed by a vote of 41 to 7, the negative votes being cast by Cullen, Foley, Grady, McCabe, McClellan, Sullivan and Wagner.

The bill taxing savings banks was passed by a vote of 35 to 13, every Democratic Senator voting against it, except Traylor, who voted for it, and Sullivan, who was absent.

The trust company taxation bill was passed by a vote of 41 to 7, Senators Cullen, Foley, Grady, McCabe, McClellan, Sullivan and Wagner (Democrats) voting against it.

BERLINER'S PATENT VANDER.

The Bell Telephone Men Appear in Danger by a Federal Court Decision.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 27.—Judge Brown of the United States Circuit Court handed down a decision today holding that as invalid the celebrated Berliner patent for a microphone attachment, on which the monopoly of the American Bell Telephone Company rests.
