

MARGIE S. WELL RIDDEN.

PIGGOTT, THE CALIFORNIA JOCKEY, MAKES A FINE FINISH.

Catches Silver Chimes in the Last Few Yards and Wins by a Short Head On the Front. Successful Favorite of the Day at the Aqueduct Track—Three Long Shots in Front.

One favorite was victorious at Aqueduct yesterday. Margie S. by Ormus—Minnie R. was the fortunate filly. She captured the fourth race for beaten two-year-olds at five furlongs. Piggott's ride was the most sensational feature of the afternoon's sport and when he landed Margie S. winner by the shortest of heads in a fierce drive he received an ovation from the crowd.

Margie S. was a 7 to 1 favorite. The talent had received such hard knocks in the first off the boards by any means. There was a plunge on both Lucrastra and Eva Mine, both of whose prices were out, while Silver Chimes at 8 to 1 attracted considerable "wise money." The start was straggling, in fact Cassidy's work in all but one event was the cause of much grumbling. Silver Chimes hit up at top speed with Lucrastra and Laracor following the hot pace with plenty of speed. Margie S. was fourth and seemed to be hopelessly out of it, but when the field straightened out for the run to the wire Piggott brought her to the front and she won by a head.

Both jockeys labored with all the resources at their command and the crowd, realizing the quality of the finish, stood as if transfixed. To some it looked as though Silver Chimes had passed the judges' stand half a head to the good, but the official ruling placed the race to the credit of Margie S.
