

GLENNELLIE'S POOR START.

HEAVILY BACKED FAVORITE WHEELS AFTER THE FLAG FALLS.

And is left at the post—Hammock Wins the Harlem Stakes and King Let Takes the Crotona Handicap—Amelia Scores a Victory—Mad Larks Lead at Morris Park.

It was what the talent called "Aquaduct weather" yesterday, but the races at Morris Park drew more than 5,000 enthusiasts, who, because of the protection afforded by the big grandstand and the betting ring, enjoyed the sport without getting drenched.

One of the public's choices, Glennellie, was left standing still at the post in the first race. The affair was for three-year-olds, over the last six furlongs of the Withers mile. Glennellie is a chestnut filly by His Highness—Nelson, and is owned by John Day.

As soon as they got to the post Glennellie began to kick up a fuss. She was obstinate and showed a tendency to make the same trouble that has been caused by her in other races. There was one break that appeared to be fair to the crowd, but Starter Fitzgerald did not let it go.

The Crotona Handicap, the first of the spring series for three-year-olds and upward, was the first and foremost of the day. It was a mile, looked to be narrowed down to the Messer, Bennett, and the Peppercorn.

The biggest surprise of the day was the easy victory of the favorite, Hammock, who, after capturing the fourth race on the card for two-year-olds, with the fat price of 2 to 1, to a unanimous vote.

For three-year-olds winners at any time of \$1,000 to 12,000 under the scale, by a majority of 80 to 1 in the Withers mile, last six furlongs of the Pelouse course.

For titles and geldings, two years old, to carry 107 pounds, winners of any race not an outright race, by a majority of 80 to 1 in the Pelouse course.
