Gen. Woodford Appeals for Home Rule, Representative Council Rives Promises Reforms and President Fornes Tells of His Troubles With Aldermen.

The eighth annual dinner of the Real Estate Board of Brokers was held last night at the Savoy Hotel. In point of attendance and in its general surroundings the dinner was the most successful of the series.

ITALIANS SPEAK FOR BOERS. Question of Intervention Raised in the Chamber of Deputies.

ROME, March 15.—In the Chamber of Deputies to-day Signor Rampelli, Engel and ten others asked in view of recent events in South Africa whether the time had not come to initiate European intervention in behalf of a people who were fighting so heroically for liberty and independence.

In reply to these questions Signor Prinetti, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, said the British reply to the note of the Dutch Government offering its good offices left no room to doubt that the British would accept intervention.

MOODY HONORED AT HOME.

Coming Secretary of the Navy Greeted by 25,000 People at His Home.

Haverhill, Mass., March 15.—The first salute of seventeen guns to the next Secretary of the Navy, William H. Moody, was fired to-night as his train drew into his home city. It was followed by the Presidential salute. About 25,000 people and all the civic organizations of the city, the military and even trades unions, welcomed the home coming Congressman.

The line of march was a mile long. At City Hall the coming Secretary spoke briefly, saying that the honor of public life were bestowed upon him upon whom they lay at the feet of his friends. He said he felt no elation at his appointment, but would enter upon the duties of the office with a keen sense of its responsibility.

The fact was shorter than it would have been had Mr. Moody received orders from his physician not to speak at all.

INDIANS MAY ADOPT WHITES. District Court of Appeals Reverses Decision of the Secretary of the Interior.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The right of Indians to adopt white men into their tribes and entitle them to share in the allotment of lands was affirmed to-day by the Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia. The opinion of the court is important in that it reverses the action of the Department of the Interior and the decision of the lower courts.

Last August Willie West, William G. Williams, E. W. McCampbell, Lyon R. Bingham, Thad Smith, Robert Currier, Robert L. Williams, Ethel Williams, Charles Williams, Ernest Cox and Jack McLane, all white men and women, but who claim to be members of the Wichita tribe of Indians by adoption, filed eleven separate suits against the Secretary of the Interior protesting against the approval of certain allotments of quarter sections of land to which they claimed they were entitled.

The Interior Department contended that Indians had no control of the matter of adoption into their tribes, except as the same might be approved by the Secretary of the Interior. Under this ruling the rights of many adoptees were denied. The lower court dismissed each of the eleven petitions for mandamus and the Secretary of the action of the Secretary of the Interior was judicial in its nature and could not be reviewed nor controlled by the courts.

The court in its opinion reversed the lower courts, holds with the contention of the petitioners that the power and authority of the tribe to adopt cannot be denied.

NATIONAL HEALTH BOARD. Proposed Change in the United States Marine Hospital Service.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The bill to change the name and increase the efficiency of the United States Marine Hospital Service was to-day favorably reported to the Senate by the Committee on Public Health and National Quarantine. It changes the name to the United States Health Service. The bill provides for creating an Advisory Board for conducting investigations by the Hygienic Laboratory, and provides also for the creation of a National Board of Health, to consist of one delegate from each State or Territorial Board of Health, to meet for conference when upon the request of five of these boards the interest of the public health is promoted thereby.

The uniformity of registration of mortality, morbidity and vital statistics is provided for by authorizing the Surgeon General of the United States Health Service after conference with the State boards to prescribe forms for their collection and compilation. In the time of threatened or actual war, when the commissioned officers of the United States Health Service are brought into official relations with the medical officers of the army or navy, they are to have rank with and after those of similar rank in their services.

Salerini counted out \$8 in change, all the money in the cash drawer and expressed regret that he was \$1.95 shy. The stranger calmly lit the cigar, picked up the ten and a two-dollar bill jammed them into his waistcoat pocket and ran out of the store.

THEATRE SPECULATORS HIT.

A DOZEN ROUTED BY A CRUISE OF THE BROADWAY THEATRE.

To Each Speculator Was Assigned a House Employee, Who Warned Buyers That Their Tickets Were Worthless—All Put to Flight, Loss \$150.

The managers of the Broadway Theatre had trouble with ticket speculators last night, and around 8 o'clock the block on Broadway, between Fourth and Forty-first streets, was a lively spot. The speculators, a dozen strong, lined up on both sides of the entrance to the theatre an hour before the time set for "The Sleeping Beauty and the Beast" to begin.

The managers of the theatre soon learned that the speculators were well supplied with tickets. Then the managers started in to outfit the speculators. To each speculator an attaché of the theatre was assigned and each time a speculator sold a ticket the theatre employee informed the purchaser that the ticket was worthless. Then the purchaser would demand the return of his money and the speculator, fearing arrest, would give it to him.

This sort of warfare continued for over an hour and then the speculators retired in disgust. They lost about \$150 on the night.

YESTERDAY'S MUSIC. Wagner for Young and Old at Carnegie Hall.

Conductor Frank Damrosch gave his clientele young and old an afternoon Wagner at Carnegie Hall yesterday. The "Brenzi" overture, the sonorous "Kaiser-marsch," the song "Dreams," arranged for violin and orchestra, and three vocal excerpts from "Tannhauser," "Die Walkure" and "Lohengrin" made up a program that gave considerable pleasure to a very large audience.

Mme. Lillian Blauvelt, pretty and ever winning, sang "Die Walkure" and "Die Walkure" with finish and considerable vocal volume. In style she has broadened much. She was applauded vehemently. A young American who has been studying abroad, Mr. Lloyd Rand, made his debut in "Siegfried's" Winterstürme während Wonnemorgen, which he sang with excellent taste and musical phrasing.

He has the manner dramatic and his enunciation is distinct. A robust tenor, his voice is rather thick and cloudy in color at times; but Mr. Rand has temperament and a marked stage presence and won three or four rapturous ovations from the audience. Mr. David Mannes, played the solo part of Wagner's "Träume" and had to repeat the number in response to insistent applause.

Mr. Damrosch's speeches were few; he allowed the music "to speak for itself," and, as Wagner is above all else eloquent, his wisdom bore agreeable fruit.

Charles Hawtreay, the English actor-manager, ended his engagement in "A Message From Mars" at the Garrick Theatre last night. At the end of the play he was presented with a life-sized lamb, made of white carnations and roses of the valley, from his friends, the Lambs.

DINNER TO SUPT. MARTIN. The Bridge Engineer Entertained by Friends at the Montauk Club.

Charles C. Martin, superintendent of the Brooklyn Bridge, whose services, first in connection with its construction and later in its management, have extended over a period of thirty-two years, was the guest of honor last night at a dinner given to him by friends at the Montauk Club. The guests numbered over three hundred.

In the parlor was set up the model of the Brooklyn Bridge exhibited at the Paris Exposition and at the Pan-American and Charleston exhibitions. The model was made by the Roehlings, who built the B. and O., and is 25 feet long.

It was brought up by special permission from the Charleston exhibition for the occasion and came near arriving too late. Because of the various freshets it got lost in transit and a committee had to be sent in quest of it. They discovered it in a freight car at the Montauk Club, which had slipped here just in time to get it at the club last night. Had it arrived early it had been the intention to set it up on the head table.

O. F. Nichols, the engineer of the Williamsburg bridge, presided at the dinner and the other speakers were David A. Body of Brooklyn, H. G. Prout, who was one of the experts engaged in the Bridge problem; Martin V. Littleton, Park Commissioner; Richard Young and Commissioner of Public Works William E. Redfield. Bridge Commissioner Lindenthal and President Grotzinger were both present but did not speak. The bridge was discussed by any of those who did make remarks.

Before the speaking the toastmaster introduced William Berri, former Bridge Commissioner, who presented Mr. Martin with a bronze statue of David. In doing so he spoke of Mr. Martin's fidelity to all the bridges of the city. Mr. Martin, in his speech, said that the bridge would connect the hearts of both boroughs and would form a great avenue from the ocean to the heart of the city. He urged the expenditure of unlimited money on it and the building of at least six railroad tracks.

A QUEER SORT OF RAID. Police Got Nothing, But There's a Tale of Vanished Roulette Wheels.

According to the Tenderloin police blotter there was a sort of raid yesterday afternoon in an alleged poolroom kept by Tim Kinney in West Thirty-eighth street, near Sixth avenue.

The police said that they didn't seize any wheels. Inspector Harley said he didn't. Frank Moss said that none of his people did. Some unofficial rumor may have made \$1,200 by his quick wit.

HOTEL CASHIER GONE. Maiden of the Victoria Had \$400 With Him When He Disappeared.

The management of the Victoria Hotel reported to the police last night that the cashier of the hotel, Robert Madden, had been missing since Monday morning. It was said that he left the hotel as usual on Sunday night and went to his home at 45 West Thirtieth street where he slept all night. He didn't appear at the hotel next day and on an examination of his books it was discovered according to Angus Gordon, the assistant manager, that he had taken \$400 with him.

The police said last night that neither he nor any one else in the management had any idea that Madden had stolen the \$400, and that he was taken from the hotel by a man who had wanted to see his accounts. Mr. Gordon said, "I was perfectly satisfied and had no idea that he was gone. Madden must have met with foul play or have been temporarily detained. The cashier had worked previously at the Victoria. His home was at 170th Street."

NEW SOUTHERN PACIFIC ROAD.

Officers of the Old Company Selected to Manage the Present Corporation.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 15.—The directors of the recently incorporated Southern Pacific Railroad Company have elected these officers: President, E. H. Harriman; Vice-President, Charles H. Tweed; Second Vice-President, J. Kruttschnitt; Treasurer, N. T. Smith; Assistant Treasurer at New York, A. K. Van Dewater; Secretary, J. L. Willcutt; Assistant Secretary at New York, Alexander Miller.

The officers are the same as those of the now defunct Southern Pacific Railroad Company of California, which, with the Southern Pacific Railroad Company of Arizona and the Southern Pacific Railroad Company of New York was consolidated into a new corporation.

The main object of the consolidation is the issuance of a new blanket mortgage on all the properties of the new company in California and two adjoining territories for the purpose of retiring outstanding high interest-bearing bonds and thus effect a saving of interest charges of \$1,000,000 a year. The bond issue was authorized at this meeting, but was deferred.

E. H. Harriman is now in Mexico with General Manager Kruttschnitt. Freight Traffic Manager William Sproule and Passenger Traffic Manager E. O. McCormick left for El Paso last evening, where they will meet Traffic Director Stubbs on Monday and it is understood three traffic officials will join Mr. Harriman's party and come west in the President's special train.

CASH, PLEASE, SAYS MRS. OAKES. Having Beaten a Divorce Suit She Asks for \$10,000 a Year to Live On.

Adeline Estelle Sullivan Oakes, who defeated the attempt of Francis J. Oakes to tie herself in the Supreme Court in a suit against her husband for a limited divorce on allegations of abandonment and cruelty. Mrs. Oakes avers that her husband has large means and such an income that the last year they resided together he had spent about \$65,000 in their maintenance. She asks for \$200 a week alimony.
