AT THE PRESIDENT'S HOME.

POSTMASTER-GENERAL PAYNE TALKS OF APPOINTMENTS.

Col. Lee, M. P. Pays a Visit—A Soldier's Bride Wants to See Her Husband Out of the Army—Great Day When Nassau Comes to Sagamore Hill.

OYSTER BAY, Sept. 13.—Postmaster-General Payne came out to see the President this morning. He had under his arm a formidable array of papers.

When he came back after luncheon he said he had talked fully about a number of Post Office Department affairs with the President and that there would be some minor appointments announced in Washington within a day or two as a result of the conference.

Col. Arthur Lee, M. P., and Mrs. Lee were the President's guests for the day. Col. Lee served as Military Attaché of the British Embassy during the Spanish war and was with the President at Santiago.

Dr. Albert Shaw was also a guest of the President at luncheon. Mrs. Horner Hale came to Oyster Bay to-day from New London. Mr. Hale is a soldier of the Regular Army stationed at Plum Island.

The preparations for the President's reception to his guests go on apace. A twenty-acre lot on the crest of Sagamore Hill has been fenced for the farmers to tie their teams in.
