

THE DEMOCRATIC SORE SPOTS

A "LEST WE FORGET" CONFAB ON THE EVE OF ELECTION.

Among Democrats Who See Only Mr. Hill's Figure in the Democratic Field and Recall the Names of Men of His Party Whom He Has Thrown Down.

On the eve of election day the Democratic situation in the State was gone over yesterday by Democrats who ought to know what they are talking about. In the first place, the Democrats said that Sen. Hill is Mr. Hill's candidate for Governor, and that any support given to Mr. Hill on election day would go a long way toward rehabilitating Mr. Hill in the State.

Then they recalled that Mr. Hill had been treacherous to every Democrat of prominence in the party since he first became Governor in 1887. They went down the list: Alton B. Parker, Robert A. Maxwell, Richard Croker, Grover Cleveland, Edward Murphy, Jr., Roswell P. Flower, Mayor Daniel E. Conway of Troy, Hugh McLaughlin, Senator Patrick Henry McCarron and James Sheelin of Brooklyn.

Mr. Hill's denials of the Democratic charges, these Democrats said, has brought out the old antagonisms against Mr. Hill who was beaten for Governor in '94 by 154,000 plurality. Hill's enemies regard Mr. Hill as merely a handle to Mr. Hill's jug of hopes to be nominated for President in 1904. They said that Mr. Hill's Government has done nothing to help the people, but has done nothing to help the party.

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CROSS BEFORE EVERY NAME

Is the Right Way to Vote a Split Ticket Tomorrow.

Are you certain that you know how to vote? Remember, first of all, that any mark other than a cross, which must be made with a black lead pencil, makes your ballot void and it will not be counted.

If you fear, define or wrongly mark your ballot you may return it to the inspectors and get another. There are but two proper ways to vote. To vote a straight ticket make a cross in the circle under the emblem of the party for which you wish to vote.

If you want to vote a split ticket you should make a cross in front of the name of each candidate for whom you wish to vote. Suppose the case of the voter who wishes to cast a Republican vote except that he wants to vote for John Clinton Gray for Associate Justice of the Court of Appeals.

The proper and legal method for him will be to make a cross in front of each of the Republican candidates except William E. Werner. There his pencil will travel across to record the cross before the name of Gray.

Where the party ticket does not offer nominations for all the offices the voter, after putting his cross under the party emblem, should make a cross in front of the names of candidates in other columns.

The Greater New York Democracy has failed to make a general assembly of its members in some districts. There the voter who puts his mark under the roster will be compelled to seek another column or his vote for those offices will be lost.

President John R. Voorhis of the Board of Elections said yesterday that the board held strictly that no voter who had not voted at the last election should be allowed to vote unless his ballot had been delivered to him by the ballot clerk. It makes no difference whether the ballot has been in the line in the act of voting once the ballot has come into his hands. It recognized no other rule.

President Voorhis said that ample provision has been made in Manhattan for the accommodation of the voter so that no citizen need be kept waiting. In one of the districts is 758, in the other 700. In the other districts the registration is less than 400. There will be about 5 per cent below the registration.

Mr. Hugh McLaughlin held a Sunday night political symposium at his residence, 100 West 10th street, last night. He expressed the opinion that Mr. Hill would be the next Governor, but would not give his estimate of the probable vote of the Kings county.

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Views of Brooklyn Leaders.

Hopes Almost to Wipe Out Normal Democratic Plurality.

Democrats Talk of From 22,000 to 30,000 Plurality, but Do Not Hope for More Than 20,000—Lieut. Gov. Woodruff Discovers a Plot to Steal 5,000 Votes.

There will be a general conference of the Republican Assembly leaders to-day for a final survey of the line of battle, and to-night all the election district captains will make preparations for the morning of the polls and the watching of the canvass of the vote. The plans include a careful tally of the vote in each district as it proceeds so that the dilatory voters, who are known to be Republicans, may be hunted up and urged to come to the polls.

All the Republican captains are apparently satisfied at the outlook. The more sanguine believe that Odell is going to almost wipe out the normal Democratic majority in Kings county, while conservative estimates place Odell's plurality at the way from 8,000 to 14,000. A few think they may reach Van Wreck's plurality of over 15,000 four years ago. All expect that Odell will carry nine of the twenty-one Assembly districts, and that three and probably four of the six Congress candidates, three at least of the seven Senate candidates and ten of the twenty-one Assemblymen will be elected.

Unlike the Republican managers, the Democratic leaders had one of the busiest days of the campaign yesterday at their headquarters in the Thomas Jefferson Hotel. The big men, including Mr. Cole, were on hand and each visitor to Chairman John L. Shea's private office returned to his lodgings with a liberal supply of badges and other things of a much more substantial character. Mr. Cole was out in the morning and it was after dinner that he put in his appearance at Democratic headquarters. He took a rosate view of the situation, remarking to his friends: "Don't I look like a winner? After an hour's session with Mr. Shea and Barney York he went off for a drive in Prospect Park with his son, Mr. Shea's son, and the crowd continued to maintain for publication that Cole would sweep the county by from 22,000 to 30,000. They all admit privately, however, that they do not believe his plurality to exceed 20,000. They were disturbed over the apparently well-organized rumors that the headquarters of the party were being systematically and openly cut both in the Third and Ninth Assembly districts and that in three other districts the knife was also to be applied in a quiet way.
