WIFE'S FEAR PRESAGES DEATH

J. H. MEYER FOUND DROWNED IN BAY AT BATH BEACH.

Police Believe He Committed Suicide, but His Family Scout the Idea—Body Was Without Wounds, and Clothing and Jewelry Had Not Been Touched.

Joseph H. Meyer, 31 years old, of the Joseph H. Meyer & Bros. jewelry firm, 606 Broadway, Williamsburg, was found drowned in Gravesend Bay, at the foot of Bay Nineteenth street, Bath Beach, yesterday morning, under mysterious conditions.

Meyer lived at 219 Adelphi street, Brooklyn. He was married only ten months ago. He left his home at 7 o'clock yesterday morning. He had previously told his brother that he was going to Bath Beach to keep an important appointment.

The body was identified at the Bath Beach police station, by Sergeant Ryder and Rouseman Konig. Considerable small jewelry was found in the pockets. On one of the fingers was a diamond ring valued at \$1,000.

Police Captain Levey is making a thorough investigation to determine whether Meyer was seen in company with any one, or whether he jumped or fell off any of the numerous piers along the water front.



GLENNON CONVICTION UPHELD. NO DOUBT OF WARDMAN'S GUILT, APPELLATE DIVISION SAYS.

It's Now Up to Devery's Friend to Appear for Commitment to Jail, but He May Appeal Higher—Out on \$2,500 Cash Bail—Seen in Broadway Recently.

In a unanimous opinion handed down yesterday the Appellate Division has affirmed the conviction of Edward G. Glennon, the Tenderloin wardman and William S. Devery's right hand man, who was found guilty last year of willful neglect of duty in failing to suppress Laura Mauney's disorderly house in West Thirty-third street, against which he had been issued a court order.

It would appear [from the testimony] that the only persons who had any difficulty in obtaining complete knowledge of the character of this house were the police officers charged with the duty of observing and inspecting the house and suppressing it; and if the testimony is true, and certainly the jury had a right to credit it, a slight observation by a police officer should necessitate a disclosure of the character of the house and furnished him with the evidence to justify him in applying for a warrant for the arrest of those engaged in maintaining and operating it.

Glennon was sentenced to serve six months in the penitentiary, but was admitted to bail by Justice Gaynor on a certificate of reasonable doubt, depositing \$2,500 cash with the City Clerk.

HEALED BY "SYMPATHY WATER." Clairvoyant Fined for Unlawfully Practising Medicine. Marsela Bryan, who says she is a clairvoyant, was arraigned in the Court of Special Sessions yesterday, charged with practicing medicine without a license.

The sister, thinking the gun was not loaded, pointed it at the boy, exclaiming: "I'll shoot you." The ball pierced the brain.





Bellevue's "Silent John" Is Dead. John Brill, known as Bellevue Hospital as "Silent John" because he never could be drawn into a discussion, died yesterday at the hospital of influenza. Brill had been employed around the hospital for nearly thirty years. His work was to carry milk and provisions from Bellevue to the emergency hospital, about two blocks away. Two months ago he was knocked down by a truck and since then he had failed rapidly. Nothing was known of his family until his relatives in Arlington, Mass.
