**PAULIST PRIEST'S FUNERAL.**

**3,000 THERE TO MOURN THE DEAD FATHER ROBINSON.**

Solemn Service, Followed by an All-Night Vigil, Which Hundreds Shared—Today the Requiem Mass Will Be Sung—Last of the Early Paulists Coming for It.

Three thousand persons were present last evening at the beginning of the funeral services for Father Thomas Verney Robinson in the Church of St. Paul the Apostle. A few minutes before 7 o'clock the leaden coffin, heavily draped in black, was placed upon an elevated catafalque before the altar. Then the church doors were thrown open and the crowd surged in.

For an hour afterward men, women and children passed up the centre aisle in hundreds to look upon the face of the dead priest. Some of them had seen him for the first time years ago, when he first came from his home in Virginia. There were many whom he had baptized. For others he had performed the marriage ceremony. From his kindly hand many of them had received assistance in the hour of need.

At 8 o'clock the service for the dead began. The vested choir of eighty entered from the sanctuary and filled the church with the mighty music of the "Miserere" as slowly they moved along the aisles through the crowd and took their places within the sanctuary. The celebrant, standing at the foot of the catafalque, intoned the "De Profundis," at the same time sprinkling the body with holy water. Then the choir took up the psalm of mourning, and continued until they came to the words: "Eternal rest give unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him." Then was sung the "Subvenite sancti Dei," and the vesper service proper began.

As the cadences of the "De Profundis" rose and fell the aged missionary, who had not one member of his distinguished family to mourn at his side, was wreathed by hundreds of women and the eyes of many an old soldier, and younger man as well, were moist.

"After the 'Pater Noster,' to the low strains of the organ the black-robed clergy withdrew, the lights were extinguished and most of the congregation left the church. Several hundred members of the societies remained at prayer as a guard of honor through the night. During this time no lights were shown except those around the bier and the glow from the high sanctuary lamp, no movement was made, save when a flickering candle near the coffin was replaced by a new waxen light. The body of the dead priest was cofined in
